ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP: PILGRIMS OF HOPE

nvironmental Stewardship is the responsible use and protection of the natural world through conservation and sustainable practices. It involves taking action to preserve ecosystems, reduce pollution, and use resources wisely to ensure a healthy planet for present and future generations. It is not just about protecting nature but also about recognizing the interconnectedness of the environment, society, and the economy. Human beings who are entrusted with the stewardship of the environment by the Creator must not boss over it but walk with the environment as Pilgrims of Hope. We can do so through...

- a) Changed Mind-set and Commitment: We need to change our narrow mind-set regarding God's commandment of subduing the environment and using it for selfish purpose to a mind-set of responsible caretakers of the Earth's resources, ensuring their availability for current and future generations. Our commitment to such a mind-set is of paramount importance. (See *Laudato Si*, no. 203).
- **b)** Shared Responsibility: It is not only the responsibility of the governments or specific organizations but a shared responsibilities of all individuals, families, communities, businesses and governments.
- c) Sustainable Practices: We need to adopt those practices that ensures the long-term health of ecosystems and natural resources such as reducing pollution, by eliminating the use of plastic/thermacol/plaster of Paris in decoration, and positively by conserving water, saving electricity and promoting biodiversity.
- d) Holistic Approach: The environmental stewardship is not to be seen as distinct from our existence but it must be considered from holistic point of view such as social and economic environmental management because the human well-being is closely linked to the health of the environment.
- d) Active Participation: As Pilgrims of Hope, we, the stewards need to actively participate in the conservation efforts like planting trees, restoring degraded areas, farming, maintaining cleanliness in the surrounding, garbage segregation and management and supporting

local conservation initiatives. The last one is particularly important for us, the parishioners of Old Goa Parish. We are blessed by God with so many World Heritage Monuments. It is our duty to maintain them. We cannot allow the greedy vultures to degrade these treasures by turning a blind eye to the various illegal constructions within the protected or no construction zones or buffer zones. A master plan for the conservation of theses precious monuments is the need of the hour. We need to raise our voices at various forums permitted by the Constitution such as Gram Sobha meeting or peaceful protests or placing the objection vide social/print media, etc. We should not forget that God will hold us responsible for any damage that might be done to the environment or the Heritage Monuments during our stay in Old Goa.

To achieve the above goals, Pope Francis has called for a change of lifestyle vis-à-vis environmental stewardship (see *Laudato Si*, nos. 206-207). Although lot of damage is already done to the environment, we can still instil hope to the groaning creation (see Rom. 8:22) and lead the way by "going out of ourselves towards the other...disinterested self-centeredness and self-absorption, are essential if we truly wish to care for our brothers and sisters and for the natural environment" (*Laudato Si*, no. 208).

As Christians, we need to keep in mind, in addition to common humanity, our responsibility, as stewards, to work for the conversion of the Ecology. The ecological spirituality is grounded in the convictions of faith, since the teachings of the Gospel have direct consequences for our way of thinking, feelings and living (Laudato Si, no. 216). "This conversion calls for a number of attitudes which together foster a spirit of generious care, full of tenderness. First, it entails gratitude and gratuitousness, a recognition that the world is God's loving gift, and that we are called quietly to imitate his generosity in self-sacrifice and good works...As believers, we do not look at the world (environment) from without but from within, conscious of the bonds with which the Father has linked us to all being" (Laudato Si, no.220). The God of creation is our creator; the signs and symbols of the environment are used in the celebration and interpretion of the spiritual realities; and the incarnation of the Son of God, who became part of the environment, enhances our understanding of the spiritual connection and conversion of the environment.

Eco-Conscious families: Living Laudato Si at home

he encyclical *Laudato Si*, which called us to take care of our common home from environmental degradation and criticized consumerism and irresponsible economic development, is part of the social teaching of the Church. Quoting the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, Pope Francis asked us "to replace consumption with sacrifice, greed with generosity, wastefulness with a spirit of sharing, an asceticism which 'entails learning to give, and not simply to give up.'"

Sacrifice, and *generosity*; how can these two words, so sacred to the Catholic tradition, be incarnated within the homes of our parish?

Sacrifice is central to the Catholic tradition, particularly present in the lives of the ascetics, who give up pleasures to cleanse their lives from distraction. One thing I try to give up on is the use of snacks and sweets that come wrapped in single-use plastic. The popular saying warning us against eating empty calories: "a moment on our lips, a lifetime on our hips," could be repurposed to read: "a moment on our lips, a hundred lifetimes in garbage tips." One of the growing environmental problems in Goa is the space needed for garbage dumps. While we have a dynamic recycling industry, the fact is that there is simply no way to reuse the plastics that wrap our snacks and sweets. The silly little sweets we pop into our mouth for a few moments pleasure will outlive three generations! What we could do, therefore, is embrace the spirit of asceticism, and simply avoid these goodies. Denying ourselves pleasures daily strengthens the will to deal with greater trials. Also, while it would be a great way for them to learn and practice sacrifice and asceticism, it might be a good idea to set an example for our children, before we impose this practice on them.

The virtue of generosity can best be expressed by learning to segregate our domestic waste – into wet, which can be composted; and dry, for recycling. Adopting this system in our houses would ensure greater dignity of the sanitation workers, and ragpickers. Working to ensure the dignity of the least of our brethren is fundamental to Catholic tradition. So many in our parish live in apartment complexes, and if we established composting bins, it would contribute not just to a cleaner environment, and dignified working conditions for sanitation workers, but a glowing example of how Catholics live (Mt 5:17).

St. Francis of Assisi: Pilgrim of Ecological Hope

t. Francis (1182-1226) was born as Giovanni Di Pietro Di Bernardone in Assisi, Italy. He was canonized only 2 years after his death and is widely referred to not only as a Saint, but also as a powerful teacher of cosmic unity and coexistence.

He renounced wealth and comfort to embrace simplicity and service. He walked barefoot, wore simple robes and spent most of his time with lepers and the poor. He was a visionary who had a deep rooted connection with all creation. His reference to the Sun as "Brother Sun", Moon as "Sister Moon" and Earth as "Our Sister Mother Earth" was a reflection of his ecocentric awareness, teaching us that we humans are not above other elements. We belong to the same ecosystem and we need to coexist in harmony.

The Canticle of the creatures, depicts his reverence for ecology and elements that support it. It was written in Umbrian dialect (Medieval Italy) and is a poetic expression of cosmic unity, praising God through nature, referring to them as relatives (Sun-Brother Sun, Moon-Sister Moon, Earth-Sister Mother Earth). It is in contrast to todays' tendency to exploit nature for our benefit.

Inspired by St. Francis' life of simplicity and harmonized coexistence, in 1979, Pope John Paul II declared St. Francis The Patron of Ecology. In 2015, Pope Francis released an environmental encyclical "Laudato Si" (Praise Be To You) which begins with a line from the Canticle. This document stresses for an ecology rooted in respect for human life and the natural world.

St. Francis' message shows us that there is hope to coexist in humility, gratitude and reverence. We need to understand that creation is not our possession, it a gift given by our Almighty for us to care.

In a fast paced world, grappling with grave climate change, biodiversity loss and environmental abuse, centuries apart, St. Francis stands as an example of Ecological Hope, steering us to a more compassionate and sustainable relationship with our Mother Earth.







Understanding Church Documents in the Jubilee Year 2025



Dei Verbum

The July issue of Katedralacho ULO carried an article which provided an understanding of the second constitution-Lumen Gentium

In this issue, we cover Dei Verbum - the Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, one of the principal documents promulgated by Pope Paul VI during the Second Vatican Council, officially issued on November 18, 1965.

The Council, drawing on the precedents of Trent and Vatican I, intended to articulate the authentic Catholic teaching on how God reveals Himself and how that revelation is communicated to humanity, so that through hearing, believing, hoping, and loving, all might be drawn into fellowship with God. It is divided into Six Chapters. Here are the main highlights.

1. Divine Revelation Itself (Chapter One)

God graciously chooses to reveal Himself, His will, purposes, and divine life to humanity, calling us into communion with Him. This revelation occurs through *both deeds and words*, integrated throughout salvation history, concluding in Jesus Christ. As the incarnate Word, Christ completes revelation there will be no further public divine communication and invites a response in faith and obedience.

2. The Transmission of Divine Revelation (Chapter Two)

Though revelation is complete in Christ, it is transmitted fully and faithfully through **Sacred Tradition** (apostolic preaching, worship, life) and **Sacred Scripture**, together forming one living deposit of faith. Both this must be accepted and honoured with equal feeling of devotion and reverence. The **Magisterium** the Church's teaching authority serves this deposit, ensuring its integrity and guiding its interpretation under the Holy Spirit's guidance.

3. Sacred Scripture: Its Divine Inspiration & its Interpretation (Chapter Three)

All Scripture is divinely inspired and inerrant in matters of salvation, since God, through the Holy Spirit, guided human authors to write exactly what He intended though still using their individual style and context. Proper interpretation demands attention to literary type, authorial intent, historical-cultural context, unity of Scripture, Church Tradition, and submission to the Magisterium

4. The Old Testament (Chapter Four)

The Old Testament is the inspired word of God, enduringly valuable for Christians. It reveals God's covenant with Israel, prepares for Christ through prophecy and typology, and teaches God's dealings with humanity in justice and mercy. It is truly the "hidden" New Testament, which becomes manifest in Christ. All the promises that were made by God in the Old Testaments are coming to fulfil through Jesus Christ. To get the proper understanding of New Testament, each individual is required to know the Old Testaments.

5. The New Testament (Chapter Five)

Centred on Christ, the New Testament including the Gospels, Acts, epistles, and Revelation bears witness to His life, death, resurrection, and teachings. The Gospels are of apostolic origin and reliably convey the truth about Jesus and his others teachings while the other books clarify and apply His message under the Holy Spirit's guidance. We should understand His mission and walk on the path that He has shown to us. Following the greatest commandment that is love your enemies.

6. Sacred Scripture in the Life of the Church (Chapter Six)

Scripture is integral to the life and mission of the Church venerated in the liturgy and necessary for preaching, catechesis, theology, and personal devotion. The faithful are urged to engage regularly with Scripture accompanied by prayer and bishops are encouraged to provide faithful translations and guidance for understanding. Reading Scripture nourishes faith, fosters spiritual life, and strengthens the Church's witness in the world.


