

## CHILDREN: PILGRIMS OF HOPE

**I**n God's plan, Children offer Hope at birth: Rabindranath Tagore's quote, "Every child comes with the message that God still loves the world," is a powerful expression of hope to the despaired humanity. It is not only in the birth of a child that God gives hope, but birth of The Promised Child that truly brings hope to the fallen humanity. The prophesy in Isaiah 9: 6-7 describes that a child who will be born and will bring peace and justice, is a promise which points to Jesus, The Child, as the ultimate source of hope to humanity. Later, Jesus, although grown up, will equate receiving a child in His name, to receiving Him (Mk. 9: 37). The hope of those who dream/desire "to be greatest in the kingdom" will be realized only when they become like children; humble, innocent, trusting and receptive (Mt. 18: 1-3). Jesus points to children as the model for the type of faith required to enter the kingdom of Heaven. So, in the Bible, children are seen as sign of hope as they represent continuity, renewal, and model for faithful trust.

**Parents and elders have a responsibility to shape children into Pilgrims of Hope:** Hope is God's gift. Although, "All your children shall be taught by the Lord, and great shall be the peace of your children" (Is. 54: 13), those who have the responsibility of a child are duty-bound, by divine precept, to prepare the child to receive that gift. They are to teach the children who God is, what He has done in their lives, how He has saved them from slavery and instruct them in the precepts and ways of the Lord as well as make known the marvellous works of the Lord (see Deut. 4: 9-11). They are to "Teach them to your children. Repeat them when you are at home and when you are away, when you are resting and when you are working" (Deut. 6:7). God warns us not to lead the children to sin and despair. Jesus says, "It would be better for him if a large millstone were tied round his neck and he were thrown into the sea than for him to cause one of these little ones to sin" (Lk. 17:2). We are exhorted, "See that you do not despise one of these little ones..." (Mt. 18: 10). "Do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4). The children will become pilgrims of

hope only if they walk in the truth of God as St. John says, “I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth” (3Jn. 1-4).

**Pope urges the children to be Pilgrims of Hope:** In July 2025, addressing the young people (pilgrims) present in Rome, Pope Leo XIV reminded them that God has a plan for each of their lives. “God has created each one of you with a purpose and mission”, he said. He encouraged them to use the pilgrimage as an opportunity for prayer and discernment, urging them to “hear more clearly God’s voice calling you deep within your hearts” and thus become signs of hope.

**St. Catherine of Alexandria, a shining example for the children to become Pilgrims of Hope:** St. Catherine was born in a materially wealthy family and affluent settings. But the society in which she grew was living in the dark. The worldliness, sinful pleasures, self-gratification and total disrespect to Divine values directed their choices. In such a situation, as a young girl – brilliant, beautiful, gracious, Spirit-filled and God fearing - she became a beacon of Hope to the people of her time. She showed the way to a joyful life amidst trial and tribulations. Strengthened by faith, she followed the Saviour of the World and God of Truth. All the children must read the life of St. Catherine of Alexandria and emulate her lifestyle in order to be true Pilgrims of Hope.

**Sem. Lourdes Simoes accompanied our children in their pilgrimage:** Since June 2025, Sem. Lourdes has been walking with our children on their journey. His human and spiritual qualities attracted our children to walk joyfully and grow gracefully. His smile attracted them to meetings and other formative sessions; his conviction in spiritual matters helped them deepen their understanding of God and Church; his patient listening and generous forgiveness (of their mischievousness) helped to accept them as they are and be grateful to God. His joyful life encouraged them to continue their journey and become ambassadors of Hope. The whole parish is deeply grateful to Sem. Lourdes. As he continues his journey, may St. Catherine of Alexandria make him a true pilgrim of hope to other pilgrims.

As we celebrate jubilee of children, we exhort our children to be true Pilgrims of Hope in your families, schools, somudai, church, and everywhere you go. May Mother Mary and St. Catherine of Alexandria pray and help us.



# Jubilee of Migrants and Creation


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The Karam Festival, celebrating harvest and nature, organised by the Hindi-speaking community on the 05<sup>th</sup> of October, filled St Catherine of Alexandria Cathedral in Old Goa with a vibrant joy. This cherished harvest celebration, rooted in tribal traditions, honours the Karam tree as a symbol of prosperity and protection, connecting migrants to the ancestral homes. On this day the Adivasi community prays for the protection of crops and for the unmarried girls to be blessed with good fortune and fruitful lives as future mothers.

The celebration began at 11.00 a.m. with the Eucharistic service. The priests and the faithful were welcomed with a traditional Adivasi prayer dance. This symbolic dance honours the creation and the creator. It was followed by the incensing and blessing of the Holy Cross and the karam dali reminding the faithful of the triumph of our salvation through the Holy Cross.

The altar was decorated with jawa (millet) saplings and flowers symbolising new life and renewal, inviting the faithful to thank the creator for water, forest, land and the richness of creation.

The main celebrant Fr. Hemant Xess, OFM in his homily connected the karam festival, a jubilee of creation to the jubilee of migrants of the faithful residing and working in Goa. The mass was



con-celebrated by Fr. Simao Rodrigues, Dean, Old-Goa Deanery, Fr. Rosario Oliveira, Parish Priest, St. Catherine of Alexandria Cathedral and Archdiocese Migrant Ministry member Fr. Micheal Pereira, SVD. The Choir echoed the Cathedral walls with the sound of the Mandar and Kartal (musical instrument) played by the tribal community.

After the Eucharistic celebration, the event continued with a cultural programme. The Guests of Honour were welcomed with

an adivasi shawl and a rose. The celebrant priests were joined by the Assistant Parish Priest Fr. Jason K. Fernandes, Priest in residence Fr. Jose Remedios Fernandes, Bro. Lourdes Simoes, sisters from nearby convents and representatives of the Parish



Council whose warm presence blessed the gathering.

A lively skit brought the karam story to life, followed by cultural songs, dances and heartfelt performances by the groups present from the surrounding places. The Chief Guest, Fr. Simao Rodrigues in his speech said we are all migrants making everyone present feeling loved, cared for, accepted as one family of Christ. Fr. Rosario Oliveira's heartfelt message to welcome and celebrate jubilee with the migrant brothers and sisters touched every heart. His consistent efforts offering mass in Hindi language every second Sunday and including migrant representatives in the PPC reflect his deep commitment to unity and inclusiveness.

The karam festival was attended by around 800 Hindi speaking migrants from different places In Goa. It was far more than a cultural event, it was a testimony of faith, gratitude and unity. Through this celebration, we are reminded that faith transcends language and origin, binding us together in Christ.

The celebration ended with the Se' gardens transforming into a lively scene of dance, shared meals and laughter, mirroring the festive spirit of the migrants' home town celebrations.

In his homily based on the theme “Let us reflect on the mysteries of salvation through Rosary and celebrate them in the Eucharist”, Fr. Lucio delved into details how praying the Rosary enhances our spiritual growth and how the mysteries reflect on the life, suffering and death, His resurrection and ascension and Jesus Himself as the Light of the World which we celebrate in the Mass.

The Cathedral choir under the direction of Bro. Lourdes Simoes through their carefully rehearsed hymns, singers gave a soul searching rendition during the novenas, vespers and the feast day truly enriching the act of worship. After the feast mass, procession was taken in the church compound with the statue of Our Lady, devotees participating.

The feast day celebration including liturgical aspect was enthusiastically managed by two wards: Our Lady of Three Necessities and Cruz dos Milagres. Brass band on the Feast day enhanced the festive mood.

At the end of the feast mass devotees were presented with souvenir and were served with snacks and soft drinks.



**S**t Francis Xavier was born in the town of Xavier, Kingdom of Navarre in today's Spain. He was a companion of St Ignatius of Loyola and one of the first seven jesuits who took vows of poverty and chastity at Montmartre, Paris in 1534. He led the extensive missionary work across Asia primarily within the Portuguese empire in the East and played a significant role in the evangelization of early modern India particularly through his activities in India. In 1546, Francis Xavier wrote to the King John III of Portugal proposing measures to strength the Christian faith in Goa. Some historians interpret this letter as a request for the establishment of the Goan Inquisition while others contend that he instead called the appointment of special minister dedicated solely to promote Christianity in Goa.

### St. Bruno of Cologne

St. Bruno of Cologne Feast Day: 6th October

Saint Bruno is believed to have been born into the wealthy and influential Hardebust family in the city of Cologne, in modern-day Germany. He had a good education and a successful career. He lived in Germany during the 11th century, becoming a well-known teacher and eventually the chancellor of the Archdiocese of Rheims. While he was a chancellor, a corrupt and worldly man named Manasses of Gourany was made Archbishop of Rheims. The honest canons firmly opposed the Archbishop's ways, and Canon Bruno led the way. Suspended by the decision of a local council, the bishop appealed to Rome while attacking and robbing the houses of his opponents. Bruno left the diocese during this period. Finally, in 1080, the Pope deposed the Archbishop, and there was a cry from the clergy and laity to appoint Bruno as the next Archbishop. Bruno, however, had other plans. He resigned from his prestigious positions in Rheims and set out to answer God's call to a new life. In 1084, he withdrew to the Chartreuse Mountains with six companions to live as a community of hermits. St. Bruno is the founder of the Carthusians. The Carthusian order still maintains its original commitment to solitude, work, and prayer. Bruno enjoyed about six years of solitude in Chartreuse until, in 1090, he was called to Rome by Pope Urban II as a papal advisor. Bruno obediently went to the aid of Pope Urban, serving him quietly and personally within the Lateran palace in Rome. Pope Urban wanted to make Bruno the Archbishop of Reggio, but Bruno once again opposed the idea. In 1091, St. Bruno founded a monastery in Calabria, in Santa Maria della Torre, Diocese of Squillace, where he would remain until his death on October 6, 1101.

As we honor Saint Bruno on his feast day, we call to mind the radical life of solitude and prayer that he and so many Carthusians have lived after him. Let the witness of St. Bruno's life guide us as we ponder the busy lives we lead today, filled with the anxieties of the world. Let us spend more time alone in prayer and detached from all the distractions of this material world. Let us discover the joy of union with God in prayer and solitude.

Having reflected on 3 Apostolic Constitutions of the Second Vatican Council in our earlier issues i.e. *Dei Verbum* (Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation), *Lumen Gentium* (Dogmatic Constitution on the Church) and *Sacrosanctum Concilium* (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy), we now turn our attention to the fourth Constitution - *Gaudium et Spes* (Latin for Joy and Hope). Officially titled Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, it was promulgated by Pope Paul VI on December 7, 1965. It addresses the role of the Church in the contemporary world and engages directly with issues of culture, economics, politics, marriage, and peace.

## THE CHURCH AND MAN'S CALLING

### Chapter 1: The Dignity of the Human Person

Society must be built on justice, love, and mutual respect, which include, understanding mankind, their emotions, feelings, and providing moral support whenever they are in need. This brings advantages for the strengthening and betterment of human qualities. Universal solidarity and the common good are emphasized.

It exists to serve all people, regardless of religion or background, by promoting justice, peace, and the dignity of every person.

The Church is open to dialogue and collaboration with governments, scientists, economists, educators, and other religions. Together, they can work for the common good and address pressing global problems like poverty, war, injustice, and moral confusion.
