SERVANT LEADERSHIP Rooted in CHRIST

hen we think of Christian leadership, we have to begin by filtering out many of the worldly models we have consciously or sub-consciously acquired.

Christian leadership is all about service- it's a foot-washing ministry. The source and power of effective Christian leadership lies in the leader's own relationship with the Lord, and not in systems, methods and techniques

Of course these things are very useful, and we need to be trained in some basic skills. But we are called to be God and people- centered. You and I are not great healers, teachers, pastors or reconcilers- however many courses we may



have attended and however well-trained we may be. We are ordinary weak and sinful people, just as vulnerable as those for whom we-are caring and those we are leading.

GOD'S WAYS ARE NOT OUR WAY'S

God has chosen us and he wants to use us as channels for his unlimited love and power. Don't ask me why most of us are not particularly impressive but we can be encouraged by looking at the great leader in the bible. God chose David to succeed Saul (1 SM 16) but when Samuel came to the family of Jesse to anoint the future king, David was still out looking after the sheep. His father hadn't even bothered to call him back to meet the great prophet! "But my ways are not your ways", says the Lord, and he proves it time and again by choosing those who to us seem weak and foolish. Efficient, competent, relevant, successful-none of these descriptions count for very much in God's eyes. so what sort of people is he looking for?

ARE WE REALLY MEN AND WOMEN OF GOD?

A Christian leader is called to lead people to Jesus Christ. The word "lead" means to guide or to go ahead of, so we can only be leaders if we are determined to draw closer to Jesus Christ ourselves and to help others do the same. It is not enough for the priests and ministers for the future to be moral people, well trained, eager to help their fellow humans, and able to respond creatively to the burning issues of their time. All of that is very valuable and important, but it is not the heart of Christian leadership." "The central question is, are the leaders of the future truly men and women of God, people with an ardent desire to dwell in God's presence to listen to God's voice, to look at God's beauty, to touch God's incarnate Word and taste fully God's infinite goodness?"

"GOD CHOSEN WHAT IS FOOLISH BY HUMAN RECKONING"

Let me point out again what unlikely people God has often chosen as his life with leaders. Look at Simon Peter – after sharing his life with Jesus for three years he could still stay under pressure "I do not know the man". Only after the most dramatic experience of the power of the Holy Spirit was he ready to assume the responsibilities of the leadership for which Jesus had prepared him. But the Lord knew what he was doing when he chose Peter, and he knows what he's doing when he chooses us.

WHAT ABOUT US

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Are our lives also build on him, or is our cornerstone somethings else? Without the right foundation we'll never be the right kind of leader – God's kind. So before we look at all those others, particular questions, how about the hard look at our own relationship with the Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit? If everything fine, we have nothing to fear – when people follow us we can be confident they too will be drawn closer to God. But if everything isn't fine.... Then We'd better stop and do something about it before we go any further.

Love And Marriage (XII) Love brings PEACE in Marriage

eace in the natural Marriage: God established marriage as а "natural institution" between a man and a woman. It means, all the human beings who are called for marriage must follow God's natural laws their marriage as stipulated in in Gen. 2: 18-24. The 'natural marriage' is contracted between a male and female who are not only non-baptised but also between a baptised/Catholic and a nonbaptised/invalidly baptised person. Many a time, our Catholics fail to



distinguish between a natural marriage and a Sacramental marriage. When it is celebrated between a Catholic party and non-baptised person, it remains a natural marriage. Marriage can be called a "Sacrament" only if it is celebrated between the two Catholics/ validly baptised persons. One may ask, why can't the Catholic party consider his/her marriage with a non-Catholic party as a Sacrament? It is because marriage is seen as 'one' institution. Since, the non-baptised party cannot receive any other sacraments because he/she has not received the first sacrament (baptism), the Catholic party cannot also receive the Sacrament of marriage because of his/her non-baptised spouse. For this reason, the marriage between a Catholic and non-baptised is not to be celebrated within the Eucharist/Mass (which is a Sacrament). It has to be celebrated either before the Mass followed by a thanksgiving Mass or after the Mass. I have heard that even some Catholic priests (just to please the parties) celebrate such a marriage within the Mass. This is against the doctrine and teaching of the Church.

One may further question, if marriage between a Catholic and a non-baptised person is not a Sacrament, then why does the Church allow/celebrate such a marriage? In the 1917 Code of Canon Law, the norms regulating such marriages were very stringent. One of the reasons, such marriages were not permitted, was because the Parties, post marriage, may not live in Peace and that the Catholic party's faith may be in jeopardy. However, in the Vatican Council II, the Holy Spirit guided the Council Fathers to permit such marriages only if the Parties contracting the marriage are deeply in love with each other. So, LOVE between the Parties is seen as a force that unites the two persons into one. The Love surpasses everything and all the differences that may exist between the Parties including that of faith and worship. Love can also reconcile all their differences and bring Peace between them. When there is genuine love between the couple, they will overcome all obstacles and, uphold the dignity and honour of the other spouse above everything else, establish peace in their marital relationship. True Love generates understanding, forgiveness, mercy, respect, acceptance, faithfulness, sacrifice and appreciation for the other spouse thus brings harmony and Peace between them. In Gen. 2: 18-28, we find so many natural qualities that make the "natural marriage" between two non-baptised or between a Catholic and a non-baptised, a peaceful marriage. If each of the spouses considered the other as 'flesh of my flesh and bone of my bones', and treat the other as his/her 'own flesh', 'own bones', 'own blood', 'own skin', 'own heart' and 'own soul' then there will be PEACE between the couple. The Peace which the Creator has established in the nature. When the Catholic party takes initiatives in establishing such a Peace in the family of a non-baptised party, it can also serve as a means of evangelization.

Jesus has raised up the natural marriage into a "Sacramental marriage" between two validly baptised persons. If what is said above brings PEACE in a natural marriage, how much more it should do so in the Sacramental marriage between the two Catholics/validly baptised Christians? We shall reflect on the Sacramental character of marriage in another issue of "ULO".


The Holy Rosary

The name "Rosary" comes from the flower, the rose, which in medieval times was seen as a symbol of life eternal. Mary, the first to be redeemed by Christ, has been called Mystical Rose.

She reminds us that we are called to the eternal life of Paradise.

The Rosary is more than a prayer. It symbolizes our destiny in and with God according to Mary's example. To live up to this destiny, we need faith in God's marvellous deeds for us, perseverance in his ways (hope) and a practical attitude toward living our faith, that is charity. The Rosary has always been considered a powerful weapon to preserve the Christian Faith



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and to ward off the assaults of the devil and the enemies of the Church.

Importance of Rosary in our life

Praying the Rosary allows us to encounter Mary and to enter the mysteries of Jesus Christ. From this incarnation, to the Cross, to the Resurrection, we come to understand that God has revealed himself and saved us. Mary the Blessed Virgin Mary, Our Lady of the Rosary, continue to inspire us to a life of discipleship.

Rosary is Mary's instrument to bring us closer to her divine Son, and to become more involved in our lives as her children. Praying the Rosary is therefore as relevant and necessary today, and it will surely prove as efficacious as well, as it has been down the centuries.

In the recent apparitions, the Blessed Virgin Mary earnestly requested that the Rosary be prayed frequently and fervently for the world peace and for the conversion of sinners.

In Goa, our forefathers have left for us a legacy of having an evening family prayer together in our homes, that is "Rosary", which keep our families united. Also the 'Saibinn' tradition, where the Rosary is main prayer, promotes neighbourly bonding as all come together to welcome the statue of Mother Mary into our homes. Here we pray rosary, litany, sing Ave Maria, and share spirit of fellowship. The tradition has a practical purpose too – of promoting harmony and forgiveness, keeping families united and establish good relationship in the neighbourhood.

Summary of the mystery of the Rosary

The Mysteries of the Rosary are meditations on episodes in the life and death of Jesus from the Annunciation to the Ascension and beyond. These are traditionally grouped by fives into themed sets known as the Joyful Mysteries, Sorrowful Mysteries, Glorious Mysteries and the Luminous Mysteries. (After every mystery, 1 Our Father, 10 Hail Marys and 1 Glory be is prayed)

The Joyful Mysteries are marked by the joy radiating from the event of the incarnation. The Angel Gabriel appears to Mary, announcing She is to be the Mother of God. Elizabeth greets Mary: "Blessed are Thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb:" The Virgin Mary gives birth to the Redeemer of the World.

The Sorrowful Mysteries cover more than just the death of Christ. In these mysteries of the Lord's suffering and death, we are brought deep into the pains of humanity which Christ humbled himself to experience – desolation, mortification, humiliation, exhaustion and death.

The Glorious Mysteries focus on the Glories of God through His Triumphant Resurrection, Glorious Ascension, and the Supernatural Decent of the Holy Spirit, as well as through His most perfect created being, the Blessed Virgin Mary, in her Glorious Assumption and Coronation in Heaven as Queen of heaven and earth.

The Luminous Mysteries refer to Christ's Public life, and are his Baptism in the Jordan; his self – manifestation at the wedding of Cana; his proclamation of the Kingdom of God, with his call to conversion; his Transfiguration; and his institution of the Eucharist "as the sacrament expression of the Paschal Mystery".

The month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. All of us live busy and distracted lives but we need to step back to retreat from the busyness and distractions of our day, switch off the mobiles, and social media, and quiet our minds. Take a moment today to pray the Rosary. Offer it for a friend or family member, for peace of mind, for peace in the world. May Jesus and Mary bless us all.

What are Angels?

C or centuries, artists have portrayed angels as beautiful humans with wings and glowing light, complete with halos, harps, and flowing white gowns. Angels have inspired all sorts of imaginative stories and depictions, but what does the Bible say about angels? **God created angels**

In the New Testament Paul tells us that God created all things "visible and invisible." and specifically includes the angelic world with phrase "whether the thrones or dominions principalities or or authorities" (Colossians 1:16).



The author of Hebrews suggests that all angels are "spirits" (Hebrews 1:13-14). When Jesus appears to the disciples, he asserts that "spirits" don't have bodies like he does (Luke 24:39). In the Bible, angels can't usually be seen by humans unless God reveals them (see Numbers 22:31, 2 Kings 6:17, Luke 2:13). However, from time to time angels took on a bodily form and appeared to various people in Scripture (Matthew 28:5; Hebrews 13:2).

Angels, like us, are individuals. God sends angels to warn, comfort, and guide people by communicating his messages to them.

There are nine types or choirs of angels within three major groups.

Seraphim- means "the fiery ones." and they worship God continuously and say, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory" (Isaiah 6:3).

Cherubim (plural of cherub)- These angels are the keepers of celestial records and hold the knowledge of God.

Thrones- They serve as God's chariot and dispense his judgment in order to carry out his desires for us.

Dominions or Dominations- The angels exist in a state of transition

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between the celestial and human worlds and are considered as heavenly governors, attempting to strike balance between matter and spirit, good and bad.

Virtues- virtues are in charge of maintaining the natural world, and they inspire living things in areas such as science.

Powers- Powers are border patrol agents between heaven and Earth. They are the angels of birth and death.

Principalities- Just like a principal in school, the principalities oversee everything. They guide our entire world.

Archangels- These, along with the angels, are guardians of people and all things physical.

Angels- They are guardians of people and all things physical. These angels are sent as messengers to humanity. Guardian angels come from this category. Angels may protect and warn humans, as well as act as warriors on behalf of God.

The Bible clearly tells us that God sends angels to protect people: "He will give his angels charge of you to guard you in all your ways. On their hands they will bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone" (Psalm 91:11–12).

On 29 September we celebrate the Feast day of the Archangels: St. Michael, St. Gabriel, St. Raphael.

Saint Michael the Archangel is the leader of all angels and of the army of God. This is what the title **«Archangel»** means, that he is above all the others in rank. St. Michael has four main responsibilities: to combat Satan, to escort the faithful to heaven at their hour of death, to be a champion of all Christians, and the Church itself and to call men from life on Earth to their heavenly judgment.

Today, St. Michel is invoked for protection, especially from lethal enemies. He is also the patron of soldiers, police and doctors.

St. Raphael is one of the Archangels who stand before the throne of the Lord, and one of the only three mentioned by name in the Bible, in the Book of Tobit. Raphael's name means **"God heals."**

St. Raphael is the patron saint of travelers, the blind, bodily ills, happy meetings, nurses, physicians and medical workers. He is often pictured holding a staff and either holding or standing on a fish.

St. Gabriel is an angel who serves as a messenger for God to certain people. Gabriel is mentioned in both the Old and the New Testaments of the Bible. First, in the Old Testament, Gabriel appears to the prophet Daniel to explain his visions. In the New Testament, Gabriel, is described as **"an angel of the Lord,"**

Gabriel is recognized as the patron saint of messengers, telecommunication workers, and postal workers.
